Sparky and Rhonda Rucker bring music, stories, history

Prepare for an enriching evening steeped in traditional American folk music, history, storytelling, and tall tales when Mad Folk hosts the husband-and-wife duo of Sparky and Rhonda Rucker in Madison on Friday, April 17.

Sparky and Rhonda lead audiences on an educational and emotional journey, weaving music into captivating stories not told in the history books on topics such as slavery, African-American history, the Underground Railroad, and the Civil War. Their music covers old-time blues, spirituals, ballads, Appalachian music, slave songs, cowboy music, work songs and railroad songs, plus original compositions.

Sparky has been performing for over 40 years. He is known not only as a musician, but also as a folklorist, historian, storyteller, and author. Raised in a large family of Tennessee storytellers, he is a natural storyteller. He began playing guitar at age 11. After graduating from the University of Tennessee, Sparky taught school in Chattanooga. He was active in the civil rights movement, playing freedom songs at rallies, marches, and sit-ins alongside other folksingers such as Guy Carawan and Pete Seeger. His songs feature fingerstyle picking and bottleneck blues guitar, banjo, and spoons. He is a popular teacher at folk music camps and schools.

Sparky has appeared at many storytelling festivals and has contributed to anthologies that included the nation's best professional storytellers. He was presented with the Life Membership Award by the National Association of Black Storytellers.

Sparky has appeared on numerous radio programs, including National Public Radio's Morning Edition, A Prairie Home Companion, and Mountain Stage. He also performed in two videos produced by the Public Broadcasting System.

Sparky has served on the boards of Sing Out! magazine, the John Henry Memorial Foundation, and the Southern Folk Cultural Revival Project (SFCRP). He also toured

throughout the South with the SFCRP for several years with such luminaries as Johnny Shines, Olabelle Reed, Nimrod Workman, Hedy West, Mike Seeger, and Bessie Jones & the Georgia Sea Island Singers.

Pete Seeger said, "Sparky Rucker is unique! He'll make you glad to be alive and struggling."

Rhonda grew up as a piano player and organist in Louisville, learning many old hymns and gospel songs from the Methodist Church. She completed a medical degree and residency at the University of Kentucky, then practiced medicine for five years before becoming a full-time musician. In 1989 Rhonda taught herself how to play blues harmonica, first studying the techniques of renowned blues harp player Sonny Terry, then branching out. She began playing harmonica on stage with Sparky, and later added clawhammer banjo and rhythmic bones to her repertoire. Rhonda also adds vocal harmonies to the duo's songs.

Sparky and Rhonda perform for audiences of all ages throughout the United States, Canada, and Europe at festivals, schools, libraries, and historical sites. Their historical program entitled "The Blue & Gray in Black & White" relates personal stories from the Civil War in music and narrative and focuses on the war's impact on different regions of the country. Sparky & Rhonda performed their program of songs and stories, "Heroes and Hard Times: A Black Folk Odyssey," at the Kennedy Center for Performing Arts in February 2005. They were featured on the National Public Radio program On Point in November 2007.

Sparky and Rhonda have been tellers-inresidence at the International Storytelling Center in Jonesborough, Tennessee. Both also contributed articles for the Encyclopedia of Appalachia, which was published by the University of Tennessee Press.

Sparky and Rhonda Rucker will play on April 17th at Immanuel Lutheran Church at 8:00pm. Tickets are \$14 in advance and \$16 day of show. Please bring an item for donation to the local food pantry too! 🎶



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Way #2 - unplugged

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Karen Savoca & Pete Heitzman presented by MadFolk and Mad Toast Live! on 5/5

Singer/songwriter Karen Savoca, first of all, is not a chick with a guitar. Voice is her first instrument. The other is conga. The daughter of a big band vocalist, she has a love for the old standards of her parents and grandparents, the rhythm and blues of the sixties, and the singersongwriters of the seventies and eighties. Karen spent her childhood harmonizing with her family around an old upright piano, and she draws you into her world like she's inviting you to the table for supper. Whether set in a garden or on a city street, funny or poignant, her songs are full of lasting images, melodies and characters.

Pete Heitzman has had a guitar on his lap since he was ten, and was playing in bars by the time he was in eighth grade. A versatile and improvisational player, he has created a style that is all his own, innovative and refreshing. Pete bends, plucks, and wrings captivating

textures and soundscapes from the guitar or six-string bass, and has been aptly described as "the aurora borealis of guitar players".

On May 5, Mad Folk joins Mad Toast Live! in bringing you an evening of music with this talented duo. The show will be at The Brink Lounge at 7:00pm. Tickets are \$14 in advance and \$16 day of show. Please bring a nonperishable food item to donate to the local food pantry.

Tracy Grammer's Mad Folk debut final concert of the season 5/9 at Wil-Mar Center

Formerly half of a duo with the late Dave Carter, Tracy Grammer now tours internationally with songwriter and multi-instrumentalist Jim Henry (Deb Talan, Mark Erelli, The Burns Sisters). With acoustic and electric guitars, beautifully matched voices, dobro, mandolin and violin, this duo shares original songs, instrumentals, and pays homage to Carter and other stellar writers while charting a brand new course for themselves in the musical landscape. Grammer says, "I'll keep on singing, and I'll keep on telling my story, however that evolves. Working with Dave Carter was the first step on what I hope is going to be a long and fruitful road for me: the endless quest for authenticity through music."

Grammer's much anticipated solo debut album, Flower of Avalon (Signature Sounds 2005), showed up on "Best of" lists and listener polls

around the country, and was the #1 most-played album on folk radio across the United States for 2005. She has released three titles since, the latest being a Christmas album in 2007.

Bluegrass workshops and concert with Bill Evans and Megan Lynch 4/25

The Southern Bluegrass Music Association presents banjo player Bill Evans and fiddler Megan Lynch in a day of workshops and an evening concert on April 25. San Francisco Bay Area musician Bill Evans, author of Banjo for Dummies, occupies a unique niche in the banjo world: celebrated worldwide for his traditional and progressive bluegrass banjo styles as well as his innovative original compositions, he also enjoys a reputation as an outstanding instructor as well as being an expert player of 19th century minstrel and classic/parlor banjo styles. His touring partner Megan Lynch is a six-time national champion fiddler, often considered the hotbed of fiddle music west of the Rockies. Bill and Megan will each give a 3-hour workshop on banjo and fiddle, respectively; a 2-hour jam workshop for all bluegrass instruments; and an evening concert. The event will be held at the Wil-Mar Neighborhood Center on the east side of Madison and emceed by country music historian Bill C. Malone, host of Back to the Country on WORT FM 89.9.

In the style of the few remaining newspapers, I thought I'd try a more visual Whither Zither. This one's about a 1759 song that some call the "Earliest surviving American secular composition," My Days Have Been So Wondrous Free." Many sites attribute the whole works to Francis Hopkinson (1737-1791) but it seems he really only wrote the melody. The lyrics were written years earlier by Thomas Parnell (1679-1718) who I don't believe ever set foot in America.

My Days Have Been So Wondrous Free

My days have been so wondrous free,
The little birds that fly
With careless ease from tree to tree,
Were but as blest as I,
Were but as blest as I.
Ask the gliding waters,
If a tear of mine
Increased their stream,
And ask the breathing gales
If ever I lent a sigh to them,
If I lent a sigh to them.

Parnell entered Trinity

college in Dublin at age 13, became a minister,

and was an eventual pal of Alexander Pope and Ionathan Swift. Parnell was a depressive, alcoholic minister. His freaky poem "Night Piece on Death", appropriately published posthumously, is considered the first work of the Graveyard School of poetry. In it, King Death observes:


When men my scythe and darts supply How great a King of Fears am I!

SWBMAI adds instructors, options to jam class program

The Southern Wisconsin Bluegrass Music Association has expanded its instructor-led jam class program and now features different instructors every Tuesday, every week, all year long.

And the classes aren't all just for beginners anymore. The second Tuesday is geared specifically for seasoned players looking to polish their skills.



Private lessons usually cost about \$1 per minute. SWBMAI makes group lessons available to everyone and anyone for a mere \$5 suggested instructor donation for a class that typically runs for over an hour.

Tuesday jam class instructor line-up

- 1st Tuesday, 7:30pm John Peik's Beginners' Jam Jon Peik continues the popular class sessions that laid the foundation for all SWBMAI jam classes. Jon is accomplished on guitar, mandolin, 5-string banjo, keyboard and acoustic bass. Jon is a founding and current member of the Nob Hill Boys and Above the Town. He teaches at Spruce Tree Music, Hartland Music and works as the music coordinator at his church.
- 2nd Tuesday, 7:00pm Chris Powers' Improving Players Jam Chris Powers sings and plays guitar, mandolin, bouzouki and mandola with the Old Tin Can String Band. He has been the band leader for the Madison string bands Twang City Bluegrass, Bluegrass Survivors and The Hardly Brothers. He teaches the course "Folk and Bluegrass Jam" for the UW-Extension, and regularly taught the "Folk Ensemble" classes at School of the Arts at Rhinelander. He also hosts a weekly radio show, the "Mud Acres Bluegrass Special," on WORT-FM.
- 3rd Tuesday, 8:00pm David Nance's Beginner's Jam Dave Nance may just be one of SWBMAI's leading Renaissance men. By day he is a hard-working attorney but in his free time you'll often find him

- immersed in his dual hobbies of music and photography. Dave is self-taught and plays guitar, dobro, mandola and bass. He's a regular at many area jams and is a member of the Weary Travelers Traveling Band.
- 4th Tuesday, 7:00pm Catherine Rhyner and Mary Helmke's Good Old Days Jam According to Catherine, this instructor-led beginner session is "another chance to go out to play music and just jam, jam, jam. Everyone is welcome ... sit up front, sit in the back, you can play, lead, follow, sing or just hang. We don't care. We promise to keep the music going in a safe, coming-out, come-as-you-are environment. Please, come on down for a bit of the good old days."
- May 12th, 7:00pm John Fabke's Improving Players Jam John Fabke specializes in the old-time instrumental and vocal styles on banjo, guitar and mandolin. He is a highly experienced instructor and has been involved in the "Bluegrass in the Schools" program. Selected performances include "A Prairie Home Companion," NPR Clearwater Broadcast, Festival of Appalachian String Band Music, as well as an appearance with the award-winning Nob Hill Boys. John also hosts the weekly radio show, "Pastures of Plenty," on WORT 89.9 FM.
