Rod MacDonald to perform in Madison on April 2

In a musical career spanning almost three decades, Rod MacDonald remains an audience favorite at many



of the world's finest clubs, concert halls, and festivals in the U.S., Europe, and Canada. A singer-songwriter who has transcended the typical folk genre into a progressive, contemporary eclectic style of blues, jazz, rock 'n' roll, pop, and folk, Rod is an international touring and recording artist with seven critically lauded solo recordings to his credit.

Rod was a pivotal figure in the Greenwich Village '80s folk revival, appeared alongside Emmylou Harris, Shawn Colvin, Tom Paxton, Doc Watson, and many others. Many well-known folk performers, including Dave Van Ronk, Garnet Rogers, Four Bitchin´ Babes, and Happy Traum have performed his works. Rod's classic "Sailor's Prayer," which he performs acapella, has itself been recorded by more than two-dozen artists.

A resident of Delray Beach, Florida, since the mid-'90s, Rod is a frequent performer in Florida venues, and is credited with igniting the very active

Florida folk music scene. He has been labeled by the press as "singer-songwriter extraordinaire," and is considered one of contemporary music's most gifted singer-songwriters.

Rod's love for music and his reverence for life is very evident in his music and live performances. A prolific songwriter and a seasoned entertainer, he is especially known for his insightful commentaries on a variety of political and social issues.

He is a modern-day troubadour whose lyrics are intelligent and humorous, passionate and poignant. His unique style of music, showcased in a richly textured tenor, is infectious and inspiring, often humorous, sometimes reckless, frequently evocative, usually thought provoking—and always compelling.

Rod brings his considerable talent to Madison on Saturday, April 3 at the Wil-Mar Center, 953 Jenifer Street. Admission is \$12 advance and \$14 day of show.


Mad Folk hosts Bill Staines in bi-annual concert

Every other March since at least since 1996 (and many other concerts prior) Bill Staines has been gracing Madison with his warm voice and gentle wit. This year he will be bringing his songs to First United Methodist Church on March 6 at 8 p.m. Tickets are \$14 in advance and \$16 the day of the show. Opening the show will be Midwest transplant Alastair Moock.

If you are not familiar with Bill Staines' music, you will be in for a special treat. His fan base here in Madison is strong; the last time he played here was during a huge snowstorm, and it did not keep folks away. We actually had people who skied to the show! With fans that dedicated, you know you can't miss attending this show.

For over 35 years, Bill has criss-crossed the United States touring, doing more than 200 shows each year, which is over 65,000 miles annually. He will bring you his songs of the road. In minutes, you can feel the chill of the Montana night air and hear his thoughts about the people of the Midwest or the adventurers of the Yukon. Bill and his music represent a true slice of Americana.

Opener Alastair Moock may not have as many years or miles that Staines has, but you will find he has the voice of a seasoned traveler. "The first thing you notice is the voice. It sounds older then the still-boyish face from which it comes, a weathered, whiskey voice full of fine gravel, smoke and soft

"Tom will be terribly missed but he will continue to be a presence both in our hearts and onstage," says Chuck Romanoff. "Our plans are to continue performing as a duo, hoping audiences will sing just a little bit louder from now on.

Proceeds from a raffle the night of the concert will benefit the Down Syndrome Association of Wisconsin. The association provides educational programs and support to individuals with Down Syndrome as well as to their families.

Schooner Fare is one of folk music's most popular and enduring acts. The band members celebrated their 28th anniversary last November and are widely regarded as Maine's musical ambassadors. Schooner Fare is wellknown to Wisconsin audiences from frequent appearances at Milwaukee Irish Fest.

leathers," observed Scott Alarik of The Boston Globe. Moock also sings original tunes that borrow heavily from the roots of American folk, with lyrics that are full of simple truths and warm wit. Moock's newest CD, his third, is called A Life I Never Had, which features Tracy Grammer, the late Dave Carter, Ellis Paul, and Mark Erelli. Moock has spent many years on the Boston Music scene, but Iowa is now home base when he is not zig-zagging across the U.S.

In addition to being a past winner of the Kerrville Folk Festival New Folk award, Johnsmith has released four CDs to rave reviews from trade publications such as Dirty Linen, Performing Songwriter, and Sing Out! Magazines. He has also served as a staff songwriter for the WrenSong Music Group in Nashville. But again, accolades, competitions and quotas are not what motivate Johnsmith. Music is simply his gift, and he feels compelled to share it. That means more than all the hype, any day.
