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Mad Folk brings Garnet Rogers for May 21 concert

Garnet Rogers, a favorite of Madison audiences for more than two decades, will appear in a Mad Folk-sponsored concert on Friday, May 21 at 8 p.m. at the Wil-Mar Center, 954 Jenifer Street.

Opening the show will be Madeleine King who is from the San Francisco Bay area and is making her first appearance in Madison.

Garnet was raised in Hamilton, Ontario, in an exceptionally musical family. His parents were fascinated by old style country and country blues artists. His deep love of incredibly diverse musical styles results in a performer and writer of genuinely rich surprises. He has all the influences his parents brought to him and draws from the incomparable writ-

ing skills of his older brother Stan, who died in a plane accident in 1983, as well as the music of such disparate artists as the Band, Jimi Hendrix, Joseph Spence, Spider John Koerner, and the traditional folk musicians of Nova Scotia, where the Rogers family often spent their summers.

Just after Garnet graduated from high school, he and Stan went on the road together as a full-time working band. After the tragic death of Stan, now acknowledged as one of the world's most gifted writers of traditionally styled songs, Garnet carried on and became a writer of equal skill.

Garnet Rogers has a rich and melodic voice, phrasing his singing with the skill and confidence that comes from years of crisscrossing North America for the sake of music.

His presence on stage is large in all ways, but softened with a twinkle of humor and an aura of friendliness. His sets, depending on his mood and that of the audience, can range from mostly traditional songs, to songs of contemporaries such as his brother, to works of his own writing.

Tret Fure & Judy Small Together in Madison

For the first time in a Madison concert, Tret Fure and Judy Small will be performing together at the First Unitarian Society at 4 p.m. on Sunday, May 2. These women have not only walked the world of folk music, but they both pioneered the feminist movement and music scene in their respective countries.



Tret Fure

Tret Fure is one of the most prolific artists in the contemporary singer-songwriter arena. Over the past 30 years, Fure has engineered and produced countless recordings by a variety of artists, including her own work.

In the early seventies, Little Feat's Lowell George produced Fure's self-titled debut on MCA Records. By the mid-1970s, she became one of the first women sound engineers in the country, and by the end of the decade she left the mainstream to work in the blossoming genre known as Women's Music.

Through the 80s and 90s, Tret engineered and produced five of Cris Williamson's solo releases as well as the three releases they recorded as a duo: Postcards from Paradise, Between the Covers and Radio Quiet. Her own acclaimed work includes Terminal Hold, Edges of the Heart, Time Turns the Moon, Back Home. My Shoes is her latest and best work to date.

Judy Small is one of Australia's highly acclaimed treasures. Judy was recognized by her industry with a 'Mo' Award for Folk Performer of the year in 1990 and in 1997 was honored as Performer of the Year at the prestigious Port Fairy Folk Festival.

She has shared the stage with many of her childhood idols: Ronnie Gilbert, Pete Seeger, Arlo Guthrie, and Odetta to name a few. She is also highly respected among her native peers. Her songs have been recorded by Gilbert, Eric Bogle, The McCalmans, The Corries, Charlie King, and Priscilla Herdman. She regularly tours in North America, the UK, New Zealand, and Denmark.

In a full and varied career, Judy is educated in psychology and the law. She studied the latter while she was working full time as a musician, and was admitted to the bar as a practicing solicitor in her hometown, Melbourne, in 1999. In 2003, she released her 10th album, titled *Mosaic*.

Pat Humphries to perform May 8

Pat Humpries' acclaimed anthems, "Keep on Moving Forward (Never Turning Back)," "Common Thread," and "Swimming to the Other Side" are sung at peace and justice events around the world and have been translated into 7 languages.

Known to Madison audiences from her appearance in the annual Phil Ochs song nights, Pat is now performing with her partner, Sandy Opatow, who adds exquisite vocals, guitar playing and songwriting. The two have been performing at concerts, teach-ins and rallies, including leading 10,000 people in NYC singing their song "Peace, Salaam, Shalom" less than a month after September 11 and again at a peace vigil in NYC on the first anniversary.

"If I Give Your Name," by Sandy and Pat is the Grand Prize Winner in the Folk Category of the prestigious John Lennon Songwriting Contest.

In May 2002, Pat and "Swimming to the Other Side" were featured on NPR's All Things Considered. In the interview, Pete Seeger said, "The powers that be can control the media (but) it's hard to stop a good song...Pat's songs will be sung well into the 22nd century." The tremendous response by NPR listeners made Pat's CD, Hands, the #1 seller on Amazon.com for three days following—outselling the rapper, Eminem.

Pat and Sandy will perform in Madison on Saturday, May 8, at the Wil-Mar Neighborhood Center, 853 Jenifer St. at 8:30pm. The concert is presented by the Madison May Day Committee and endorsed by the Madison Folk Music Society. Admission is \$10 in advance and \$15 at the door. Advance tickets are on sale at Spruce Tree Music, Rainbow Bookstore, and Lakeside Press.
