Carrie Newcomer Returns May 17 at **Friends Meeting House**

Carrie Newcomer, a Madison favorite, returns for a concert Saturday, May 17, at her spiritual home, the Friends Meeting House, 1704 Roberts Court, behind the Monroe Street Associated Bank in Madison. The concert will begin at 7 pm. This is a new venue for Carrie, who has previously performed for MadFolk at the Brink, and for Parker Palmer's Courage to Teach at Orchard Ridge UCC. As those concerts in larger venues were sell-outs, MadFolk is encouraging fans to get your tickets early by offering an advance ticket price of \$18 at www.madfolk.org, or Spruce Tree Music or Orange Tree Imports. If seats are still available, they will be \$22 at the door.

On April 1st, Carrie released her fifteenth studio album, A Permeable Life, and - for the first time, a book of poems and essays with the same name to accompany it. In a recent interview, she observed "When you

live a permeable life, you're making a deal with the universe that I will be here and I will be present and I will take in the world... Songwriting, like a permeable life, requires the practice of attention, and the choice to show up as your true self in the world."

And the world that Carrie inhabits is a vast one. While making her home in Indiana, she has taught art in an elementary School in San Isidro, Costa Rica, and traveled to India in 2009 and 2011 as a cultural ambassador, including musical performances organized by the US State Dept. In 2012, she made a similar trip to Kenya on behalf of the Interfaith Hunger Initiative, performing in rural Chulaimbo, and at the AMPATH HIV center in Eldoret. Her range of causes, activities, collaborations and philosophies significantly influences her music, as does her friendship with writer Barbara Kingsolver and Parker Palmer, among others. The latter has observed that Carrie is "the most insightful and lyrical singer-songwriter I know."

In the spirit of Carrie's interest in alleviating world-wide hunger, concert attendees are encouraged to bring non-perishable contributions to the food pantry. The limited parking in front of the Friends Center should be used primarly for those with mobility issues; additional parking is available in the Associated Bank lot (avoid the ATM lane, which is open 24/7) and on street parking.

KG & The Ranger Celebrate 25 Years Along the Trail

Roltgen) have cause to celebrate! To mark this milestone and the release of their newest album, Moonlight Trails, they have planned a unique show at the place where it all began for them: the Wild Hog In The Woods Coffeehouse.

It started in 1985 at a Wild Hog barn dance, where they both showed up to play bass in the band. At the time, Karen was playing banjo with the weekend string band "Stone Soup" and invited Rick to play bass with them. They soon discovered a shared love for classic cowboy songs and their duo spun off from Stone Soup in 1989. They named themselves "KG & The Ranger" and headed out along the trail performing together. That same year they formed another kind of duo: husband and wife. Their career

was launched in a modest way with 3 shows that first year, and no thoughts of ever quitting their "day jobs". But when they found themselves doing over 100 gigs in 1999, they decided they needed to make a major life decision. In 2000 they took the plunge into full-time performing and have made their living as entertainers since then.

They are still going strong, as full-time professionals performing nationally. With numerous awards to their credit, they were voted "Outstanding Entertainers" of the Western Music Association in 2010, were three-time winners of the WMA's harmony yodeling contest, and inducted into the Old Time Country Music Hall of Fame in Iowa in 2011.

Their musical career has had many rewards deeper than simply making a living. The spirit of the music and the "cowboy way" is a passion for them. Preserving these old western gems has become a mission. Western music is not the same as today's "country music" - it blends qualities of jazz, swing, folk and country into a unique sound all its own. The wholesome quality of this music acts as an antidote to many of today's problems. They love bringing back memories for some, and introducing others to a new musical sound.

They have had amazing opportunities to meet many of their musical heroes, including Roy Rogers and Dale Evans. They have learned from the best, sharing the stage with the Riders in the Sky, the Sons of the Pioneers, Michael Martin Murphey and too many others to name.

Every show this summer will celebrate with special touches and trips down memory lane. 
Rebecca Rego @ Mother Fools Coffeehouse

A Permeable Life - carrie newcomer Signature Sounds ~ 2014

Carrie has been showing up and revealing her truest self for nearly thirty years maintaing her Midwestern roots while establishing a career that has taken her abroad as both performer and humanitarian. In addition to countless tours in Europe, Carrie has traveled twice to India as a cultural ambassador, including

musical performances organized by the US State Department. In 2012 she made a similar trip to Kenya on behalf of the Interfaith Hunger Initiative. Additionally, Carrie gives a percentage of her album sales to charitable organizations including the Interfaith Hunger Initiative American Friends Service Committee, America's Second Harvest, The Center for Courage and Renewal, and Literacy Volunteers of America.

Writer Barbara Kingslover says of Carrie, "Carrie Newcomer is much more than a musician. She's poet, storyteller, snake-charmer, good neighbor, friend and lover, minister of the wide-eyed gospel of hope and grace. All this, and she comes with a voice that declares, "Sit down a while and listen." A Permeable Life is a rich collection of music

that cuts across secular and spiriboundaries but never preach-Engaging es. melodically, Carrie's lyrics deftly tell a story while encouraging listeners to consider their own. Standout songs in this collection include Every Little Bit of It," "A Light in the Window," and "Writing You a Letter," in which small experiences take on the glow of knowing we do not live days, but moments. "The Ten O'clock Line" and "Abide" (cowritten with author Parker J. Palmer), explore themes of loss and new thresholds, musing on the possibility that what may look like a hole in one's life, may be only a space. "A Room at the Table" and "An Empty Chair" calls us to allow the troubled world to transform and move us to action. "Forever Ray" and "Don't Put Me on Hold" reflect Carrie's mischievous humor, the first celebrating love and lawn ornaments and the latter bemoaning customer service lines.

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Case Load

Every now and then someone will ask me what professional musicians jam into the crannies of their guitar cases. while I wouldn't know the answer to that, I can say what I jam into MY guitar case.

First, my guitar: a Guild dreadnaught size 12-string. It contains an LR Baggs iBeam active pickup and a 9 volt battery to power it.

Then comes the pile shown below. My case is a meteor proof thing by SKB, bought after airlines ruined lesser plywood units and the guitars therein. It has lots of padding so not much room for crap, but I still manage to tote half a mu-


sic store. The one item I am still trying to invent is a guitar stand that will fit either into the case or inside the guitar. Since the main part of a guitar is just a big empty wooden box, sometimes I wonder why some sort of telescoping legs couldn't be built into the thing. Maybe that can be my retirement project.

But anyway. This collection of bric-a-brac is ever shifting in its specifics, but the general ideas have remained pretty much the same for years. Notice that many of the supplies are duplicates and emergency backups. I have no faith in my memory and if space permitted would probably have a pair of pants tucked away here. Once I actually forgot to put my guitar in the case, and almost left a gig carrying a case with nothing in it but the stuff pictured below.

A few notes: The spare eyeglasses are of a prescription worn on stage for reading from a music stand. The guitar strap is mostly a length of parachute cord, with

a small shoulder protector cut from a vinyl floor mat for cars. Regular guitar straps take up huge amounts of room so I use this instead. The Snark tuner is one week old as of this writing, bought in Bennington VT to replace an old duct taped workhorse that finally failed. The Sabine tuner I can Velcro to my pickquard so it's a nice spare. The small lengths of duct and magic tape have come in handy in all sorts of sticky situations, most commonly when my index fingernail has broken and my Alaska Pik, which is normally held on by the fingernail, needs to be taped to my finger. The emergency lyric sheets contain two 45 minute sets of lyrics, in case we ever leave our stage songbook in the motel. The extra .025 G-string is there because I use that instead of the octave-G string that comes with a 12-string string set.

Any more detail about this collection would put a night owl to sleep, and besides, as with the assemblage in question, I seem to have run out of room.
