

# MadFolk Hosts the Folk Stage at Willy Street Fair for the 7th year! September 13th and 14th

The Madison Folk Music Society debuted at Willy Street Fair in September of 2008, we had seven performance slots over two days and the stage has been a smashing success. We have been invited back again this year and will be one of only 3 stages on Saturday and one of 5 stages on Sunday, with a total of seven performance slots over the two days. That is more performance slots then any other stage at the event. Willy St. Fair takes place on Saturday & Sunday, September 13th and 14th.

We have a mix of performers that are local, out of state, and even out of country. It is going to be a great weekend of music!

So let us give you a little information on the fine folks who agreed to play.

Macyn Taylor is an accomplished guitar player and singer. She is 20 years old and has recently graduated from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee with a Masters in Music Performance degree. Macyn has been performing since she was seven. She loves to play many different styles of music and is the 2013 Wilson Center International Guitar Competition champion. Macyn was recently given an award for "Most Promising New Talent" by Acoustic Guitar Magazine. She was also named the 2013 WAMI Folk/Celtic performer of the year.

Ken Lonnquist is a funny, thoughtprovoking songwriter, and Dave Adler is a crowd-pleasing keyboardist. Improvisational and "in-the-moment", every show's a delight.

Zachary Lucky truly is the bread and butter of the massive Canadian folk scene. With an emphasis on songwriting and an ear for delicate arrangements -Lucky's songs will haunt you and remind you of what country and western music was originally conceived as. It's safe to say that Lucky is at the forefront ot the outlaws country - singer songwriter movement. Settle down and find a home in being lonesome with Zachary Lucky's "The Ballad of Losing You."

MadFiddle is a youth violin ensemble that explores American roots fiddle music. Their repertoire draws largely upon the traditions of old-time, African-American, Scottish, Appalachian, and bluegrass folk tunes. The group, which is comprised of students ages 6-16, is backed by the Old Tin Can String Band. MadFiddle is directed by Shauncey Ali, who created the group in 2012 as a way to nurture Madison's bluegrass and oldtime music scene.

Tim Grimm makes his debut appearance at Willy Street Fair. Tim is one of those singer-songwriters that always seems to be on every road trip with me. Each of his past 5 recordings have reached the top of the Folk or American-roots charts. Grimm walks the fine line between folk and country, while maintaining a strong footing in tradition. We hear the rural rumblings that have shaped his life, but we are also invited in to a bigger picture, as evident in so much of his work. Critics searching for comparisons most often cite Johnny Cash, Woody Guthrie and (Nebraska era) Bruce Springsteen.

Since 2007, Wisconsin native Owen Mays has been crossing the United States, playing his particular brand of honky tonk classic country anywhere he can. Heavily influenced by Hank Williams, Lefty Frizzell, George Jones, of the other greats of the golden era of country music, Owen is a proud student of the history of the genre. Often referred to by friends and peers at "The Walking Encyclopedia of Country Music", any time you catch Owen on stage, aside from his original songs, and a handful of standards, you're almost always guaranteed to get a history lesson with your show.

Peter Mulvey will be adding Willy Street Fair as a stop on what has become an annual bike tour of many venues in Wisconsin. Peter will be riding his bike in for this show, lugging his Guitars and Cd's in a trailer. Peter is a native of Wisconsin, however, spent a good amount of his time in Boston and touring for over 20 years both in the U.S. and overseas, he has been back in Wisconsin for several years now. The Boston Globe wrties "Gleefully mercurial...equal parts breezy jazz and whispery folk. His voice feels like fine old leather, and his guitar sounds like it's on steroids...a superb technician with a fondness for ignoring the rules ... a genre-defying traditionalist — a knuckleballer with finger-picks" Joining Peter will be Brainna Lane, if you have seen Peter play during any of his past bike tour stops in Madison, you most likely have seen Brianna open for him. Brianna is a gifted singer/songwriter, she writes and performs on an acoustic guitar as well as a banjo and it is always a pleasure to listen to her when she hits the stage.

With centuries of family tradition behind them, they are touring the US in Fall 2014, playing music from their first album together, Os fera liluli. Luckily for Madison, they will appear Tuesday, October 7 at 7:00 pm at The Brink Lounge.

For many years, Arto and Antti have been making music together and separately with different groups, most notably JPP and Frigg. The duo has toured in Canada, Denmark, Norway and United States. They are also experienced teachers of their music and traditions, and so there are a number of possibilities at each tour date for educational workshops. Arto plays with JPP, Nordik Tree, Kaivama, Maria Kalaniemi, Erik Hokkanen & Lumisudet and performs solo. Antti is known for his work with Frigg, JPP, Baltic Crossing, Troka and Kings of Polka.

Now is the time for new adventures with this duo. I bet the Järvelä fiddlers will be in the front line for a couple more generations

# Singing the People's History: A Hands-on / Voice-on Workshop of Hard hitting Appalachian Songs

Join folklorists Michael and Carrie Kline for a foray into story and song gathering. Join in the chorus of songs which crossed the sea hundreds of years ago on leaky sailing ships, bounced along the frontier, and were preserved and rekindled by Appalachian mountaineers. Michael Kline learned these ballads, ditties and animal songs firsthand from older generations of West Virginians. Listen for influences of Scots, Irish, English, Africans and Native Americans resonating through haunting melodies.

From Michael's first LPs in the 1970s and '80s, The Poverty War is Dead and They Can't Put it Back: Songs of Coal Mining and Coal Mining Communities, the Klines are steeped in a repertoire of hard-hitting songs for social change gathered over a life time of singing and collecting in the southern Appalachians. From classics including Dark as a Dungeon and 16

# A Concert of Appalachian Songs of Love and Justice

Michael and Carrie Kline weave Southern mountain stories and folklore with spine tingling harmonies on voice and guitar. They live and breathe Appalachian music and culture. Their voices carry the songs with truth and authenticity. The Klines present their music both as entertainment and social history, with engaging ease and hard-hitting passion. They have spent years recording music and spoken narratives from Cherokee, North Carolina throughout the southern coalfields and mountainside farms of Kentucky and Virginia. They have docu-

mented southern mountain experience and music in industrial cities from Cincinnati to New England.

The Klines' high mountain harmonies meld with their intertwining bass lines on two guitars, with Michael's melodic flat-picking and Carrie's rhythmic backup. They have performed in Italy, Germany, and across the United States in living rooms, conference centers and concert halls from Maine to Ohio, New York City and Washington, D.C., Wisconsin and California. To hear them and be encouraged to join in on a chorus is

to be transported to a country church, a primeval forest, a coal miner's picket line, or grandma's kitchen. From songs such as Walk with Granny One More Time, to Coal Tattoo, all of them wrapped in a patchwork quilt of vivid images, the Klines evoke emotions that feed the soul. Kitchen songs. When they sing, you can smell the biscuits baking. The Klines' CDs featuring regional history, music and folklife will be on hand, including two new musical releases, "Working Shoes" and "Wild Hog in the Woods."

# The Art of Obscurity - IAIN MATTHEWS OMNIVORE RECORDINGS ~ 2014

When you hear the name Fairport Convention, you probably think immediately of acoustic guitar wiz Richard Thompson or of the tragic Sandy Denny. As one of two male lead singers in the band, lain Matthews was as much a part of their early success as the other two, but has never had the same name recognition. After leaving Fairport Convention in 1969 when they got too folky for him, he went on to record nearly forty more records, both solo and with a series of bands-Matthews Southern Comfort, Plainsong, and Hi-Fi. Despite his staggering output, commercial success has eluded him. Just a handful of singles cracked the top 100 in the '70s, and most just barely. Still, he's continued releasing albums that are critically acclaimed, if not exactly profitable. This indeed is The Art of Obscurity.

The record has an appealing, timeless quality. It fits in nicely be-



tween Nick Lowe's recent records and Elvis Costello's Burt Bacharach collaboration, two other Brits who have aged gracefully. Though arguably no one has aged as gracefully as Lowe. The record opens with the aching "Ghost Changes," his smooth voice complemented nicely by producer Bradley Koop's slide guitar. "Something shifted in my life, I'm not thinking quite the same," he sings, perhaps referring to his claim in the liner notes that this will be his last solo record, "though not my last recording." It's followed by the sweetly nostalgic charmer "When I Was a Boy," which over the course of six and a half minutes reflects on the joys of first discovering the Beatles, the Space Race and a time when you could leave your doors unlocked, to name a few. He assumes his audience is the same one he's always had, "Now it's PS3's and Wii's, and stay at home technologies. You and I had none of these, they're far from our reality," and honestly,

"Music," a love letter to an art form he's not sure he can be faithful to, crosses into cheese territory, like some of Neil Diamond's more embarrassing moments. Still, it's better than Diamond's "Heartlight." (Don't get me wrong, I love Neil Diamond, cheese and all.) The sleepy "Ode to Jackie Paris" is another disposable tune,

he's probably right.

a "whatever happened to" ballad wondering about the fate of the guy you wouldn't trust with your girl, but "who was the real McCoy, who was no one's boy." "The Emperor's New Clothes" has a funky, propulsive beat, like those local heroes Peter Mulvey and Willy Porter have per-

fected. Album closer "Home Pt 2" is the standout track, a declarative admission, "This is not my home, and it never will be," though having lived in several different countries, it is unclear which home he's talking about. Most of The Art of Obscurity is like this; it sounds great until you listen harder. It might be time to stop being critical and just enjoy the surface pleasures here, the bluesy guitar and Matthews's alluring voice. Maybe that's the real art.

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### Accordion Miscellany

As when driving an Isetta makes it seem like there are Isettas everywhere you look, when there's an accordion in your band, accordion lore squeezes you from every direction. My band has two members, and half of them play the accordion. Here are some often peculiar quotes about one of the world's most colorful instruments...

From ACCORDION by Robert Service:

Oh I know you're cheap and vulgar, you're an instrumental crime. In drawing-rooms you haven't got a show.

You're a musical abortion, you're the voice of grit and grime,

You're the spokesman of the lowly and the low.

You're a democratic devil, you're the darling of the mob;

You're a wheezy, breezy blasted bit of glee.

You're the headache of the high-bow, you're the horror of the snob, but you're worth your weight in ruddy gold to me.

The Felice Brothers infuse their heart break narratives with the accordion and those lucky enough to have caught them at Local 506 their last time through may have been brought to tears by James Felice's earth moving accordion work on "Goddamn You, Jim". -- Secret Carrboro Ninja Patrol, Nov 24, 2009

WASHINGTON -- Henry Kulbaski, a uniformed Secret Service agent who played the accordion on the South Lawn for President John F. Kennedy and ordered an errant aircraft shot down over the White House in 1974, died of cancer June 17 at Geisinger Hospital in Wilkes-Barre, Pa. He was 74. -- Washington Post, July 16, 2007

What I have discovered for myself is that the accordion can breathe, and that is an incredible experience. Everything vanishes, and what is left is the breath of the machine. -- Salvatore Sciarrino

imagine myself a doctor and paint pictures-one better than the other." -- A Boring Story by Anton Checkov
