#### Great Lake Swimmers a forest of arms Nettwerk Productions ~ 2015

The Great Lake Swimmers' Tony Dekker followed the release of his band's pretty great 2012 record New Wild Everywhere with the stunning 2013 solo project Prayer for the Woods, on which he played every instrument. It was so perfect, and so overwhelmingly addictive, that I wasn't sure I would ever be ready, or even want, to go back to the full band sound. Luckily, A Forest of Arms makes the reentry easy. The record's title is pulled from "The Great Bear," a tune that harkens back to Woods, a lovely lullaby lilting with lyrics seemingly stolen from woodland spirits. At once obvious and opaque, "In the call of the wind, in the waves of the sea, in the lungs of the land, in the lines of the streams, you won't believe what's out there, tracing the great green pathways." With minimal instrumentation backing Dekker's always swoonworthy voice, the song is the simplest on a record that delights in decorating every song with intriguing sounds. Guitar, banjo and brushed percussion are often the weapons of choice, but there's also an expertly deployed string section and a whole family of keyboards.

Bass player Bret Higgins significantly expands his role from previous records, proving his talents go beyond four-stringed instruments. In addition to handling the keyboards (Wurlitzer, Hammond and piano) and arranging the string parts, he also plays something called the marxophone. Wikipedia tells me it's a "fretless zither with two octaves of double melody strings in the key of C major (middle C to C"), and four sets of chord strings," and sounds like a mandolin or a hammered dulcimer. I was listening closely to "A Bird Flew Inside the House" to hear this magical instrument. But scrutiny isn't necessary-there's no mistaking it during the bridge when a light trill answers the banjo's call. The song is indicative of everything that makes the Great Lake Swimmers so great, including a propulsive, head-bobbing melody and a grand, sing-along chorus: "I'm in someone else's shoes, and I hear no good news, that I have nothing to lose. Everything's in danger and heaven needs help."

Opening track "Something Like a Storm" hooks you immediately as Dekker's vocals and Erik Arnesen's banjo jump out of the speaker. Even after multiple listens I'm still caught off guard when I hit play. As always, Arnesen is brilliant, as integral to the band as Dekker. New drummer Joshua Van Tassel is much more a percussionist than his predecessor Greg Millson. Van Tassel piles the chika chika of shakers on top of almost Brazilian-sounding drums until the song exits with a drum strike reminiscent of Paul Simon's "Obvious Child" (you know, if it were being played by a usually quiet Canadian band). Forest is gracefully bookended by the final track, "Expecting You," which mirrors many of the lyrics from the opening chapter, except this time it's unhurried, nearly resigned. The storm has been downgraded from tempest to gentle rain, with pedal steel and mellotron reinforcing the feeling.

One of the most noticeable differences between this and previous releases is the handful of songs that, without the dead giveaway of the vocals, don't sound like the Great Lake Swimmers. "I Must Have Someone Else's Blues" is very nearly a rock song, with lighthearted "na na" backing vocals and cheerful whistling. It's hard to describe what exactly makes "I Was a Wayward Pastel Bay" different—might be the Wurlitzer, might be the echoing claves. Or it might be because Higgins cowrote the music for both (and two other tracks) with usual sole songwriter Dekker. Additionally, violinist Miranda Mulholland, whom I've always found a bit distracting, appears on only half the tracks. These are all good things, very good things.
