# **DOUBLE THE DUOS, QUADRUPLE THE FUN**

Steve Gillette and Cindy Mangsen have teamed up with Lou and Peter Berryman quite a few times now over the years, and have performed together in concerts from Anaheim California to Albany New York and all sorts of spots in between, including a number in Wisconsin. The evenings unfold like this: Lou and Peter take the stage and play for about half an hour, then Steve and Cindy do the same. There is an intermission, then all four folkies take the stage and run the second half of the show sort of like a festival workshop, taking turns singing, even attempting a couple songs as a quartet. These four are close and dear friends so the camaraderie is warm and excited.

Steve and Cindy are not strangers to Madison's folk music community, and for good reason, having played here to capacity crowds on quite a few occasions. They are both excellent songwriters, amazing instrumentalists, and great vocal interpreters of the songs of others. Cindy has written such gems as "Rudy's Big Adventure" and "The Familiar." Steve has written "Darcy Farrow," "Home By Dark," and a zillion others. His songs have been recorded by everyone from Ian and Sylvia to John Denver. Their experience is wide based, both having had solo careers. Cindy has played for years in the trio (Priscilla) Herdman, (Anne) Hllls, and Mangsen. Steve and Cindy teamed up with Anne Hills and Michael Smith to form the powerful quartet Fourtold.

Lou and Peter Berryman have been making music together since meeting in high school in 1964. They write songs in the old fashioned way of dividing up the chores of lyric and melody writing, with Peter on the words and Lou on the music. Their songs have been recorded by everyone from Steve Gillette and Cindy Mangsen (!) to Peggy Seeger and Noel Paul Stookey of Peter Paul and Mary. Their style is hard to pin down but varies from completely goofy wordplay songs to more serious stuff, but almost always with a twist. As most everyone around here knows, Lou plays the accordion and Peter the 12-string guitar.

ago for her debut performance in this area. The Small 275 person theatre was almost filled on that snowy January Saturday evening; Most concertgoers probably came out of "curiosity" and "winter blues" but left with smiles, tears and a line of people trying to connect with Carter or get their CD's signed.

Since then, WI has invited her back over 8 times; not just to entertain us, but to "connect" with us as a gifted writer, singer, and Ozark Mountain story teller. She has played everywhere from outdoor festivals, to stage concerts to private house concerts to church mountain gospel concerts. Carter is at home everywhere she sings and she leaves the audience with a concert that is not forgettable.

She grew up and began her career in the Northern part of Ozark Hill country in Northeastern Arkansas. With ancestors from Scotland and her paternal grandmother Cherokee, her ethnic background is similar to most of the Ozark mountain Natives. The well known "Trail of Tears" runs through Stone County, AR, so much of the music and many of the stories are a blend of stories from immigrant settlers and pioneers to Native Americans who lived in the area for centuries.

While great bluegrass and mountain music is not rare to Stone County, the beautiful folk lyrics and stories that intertwine with Carter's familiar voice( which is very reminiscent of the 1960's and 1970's when good folk music was bursting all over this country) is indeed a rare pleasure to hear . Her simple guitar chords add a quiet melody to the songs that Carolyn Carter writes and sings to share her mountain culture and life story with her audience. You have just made a friend you hope to keep for life!


Her first National recognition came as a teenager when she entered and won a prestigious Nashville recording contract. Already a young mother, she packed up two little ones and took a bus to Nashville. She stayed only as long as it took to realize that Nashville was no place for a single mom to raise two small children by herself and start a career. So her "mother's heart" took her back on the bus to her mountain home to care for her children.

It was only after her 3 children were raised and gone that Carter moved to the Mountain View, AR area known as the "folk/bluegrass capital of the World". Surrounded by hundreds of musicians that would sing on the town square or in the Folk Center, Carter was easily spotted and singled out to perform with some of the best musicians in the area, as well as sharing a night of good music with the likes of John Prine played at private parties when they would come to the area to both write and perform.

To quote a concert goer who heard her in Door County and wrote a letter to the editor of the Door County Advocate "Words are inadequate when giving praise to Carolyn Carter for her heartwarming performance......her stories, songs and soul touched me and many others to the core."

### The Mountain Goats - beat the champ merge records ~ 2015

The Mountain Goats' new record, Beat the Champ, is about professional wrestling. The cartoon cover art depicts a long-haired, muscled, shirtless man delivering a flying scissors kick to the chin of his masked opponent. In case there was any doubt, the sticker on the front proclaims "This Right Here is an Album about Professional Wrestling." So you're probably wondering what it's doing here. Champ is a decade-later bookend to 2005's The Sunset Tree, a very personal and poignant record from John Darnielle (the sole constant member of the Mountain Goats). While the latter details the emotional and physical abuse he suffered at the hands of his stepfather, the former celebrates the one thing they had in common and enjoyed together. This is the world of professional wrestling before it became big business in the 80's, back when the heroes and heels of the ring were only that to a regional following. While every song on Champ is about wrestling in theory, most are also sly metaphors. The exception being the horn-buoyed, wholeheartedly enjoyable "Foreign Object," which is simply "gonna stick you in the eye with a foreign object." It's also gonna poke, jab and stab you in the eye, and it's ridiculously fun.

The toe-tapping, guitar-strumming narration on "Animal Mask" tells of coming to the rescue of another wrestler in a cage match, but it could just as easily be reminiscing on a first love. Think I'm kidding? "That was when we were young and green, in the dawning hours of our team. Some things you will remember, some things stay sweet forever." "Heel Turn 2" may concern a hero choosing the dark side, a Howard Beale who's mad as hell and not going to take it anymore, but it's really just admitting what you will do to survive. "Spend too long now trying to play fair, throw my better self overboard, shoot at him when he comes up for air," he sings before confessing, "I don't want to die in

here." As a bonus, the song's piano outro is a thing of melancholy beauty. The tragedy of "Stabbed to Death outside San Juan" is that it doesn't even happen in the ring. "The Ballad of Bull Ramos" reflects on how we feel like we become invisible as we grow older, while the actual ballad "Unmasked!" is about how we hide our real selves.


It's probably no surprise that his stepfather cheered for the bad guys, the "heels," while Darnielle idolized the good guys. The wrestler he placed on the highest pedestal was "born down in El Paso where the tumbleweeds blow to the middleweight champ of all Mexico," and is immortalized in "The Legend of Chavo Guerrero." In the tradition of great folk heroes, "he came from Texas seeking fortune and fame, rose pretty quickly to the top of his game, defender of the downtrodden, king of the hill." While he might not have been Robin Hood or King Arthur, he was definitely a hero, if only to Darnielle, "Look high, it's my last hope, Chavo Guerrero coming off the top rope." Later in life, music would be his salvation. but between the ages of nine and thirteen it was Chavo. He says in the liner notes that this album is for him, "on whom I pinned my hopes when I was very young."

It should be noted that Darnielle is referring to Senior—not Junior, who actually did gain WWE notoriety, and whom he knows nothing about. "I heard his son got famous, went nationwide, coast to coast with his dad by his side. I don't know if that's true, but I've been told, it's real sweet to grow old." It should also be noted that I actually have no idea what the move depicted on the cover is, despite the many wrestling moves my brother put on me when we were kids.
