Ari and Mia House Concert 8pm Saturday, March 11

Ari & Mia reference the styles of Southern and Northeastern fiddle music and the early American songbook to create a realm where their own compositions cross paths with older traditions. Their stylish and sophisticated music honors the sounds of Appalachian cottages, rural dance floors, and urban concert halls. Combine this with their innovative approach to songwriting and the result is a captivating sound.

"Ari & Mia are not creating a new music; they are taking it to another level and exploring areas that have not been attempted in decades. Together, the sisters have toured all across the U.S and Australia and are both graduates of New England Conservatory. Their two previous albums, Land on Shore and Unruly Heart, ranked high on the national folk radio charts. Mia's song "Across the Water," won the 2010 John Lennon Songwriting Contest in the folk category.

Folks hosting Folk: Reflecting on six years of house concerts

Our journey down House Concert Road started on Dec. 2, 2011 when, after years of pondering whether to take the plunge, we hosted our first house concert on North Few Street. Josh Harty and Sims Delaney-Pothoff from Harmonious Wail showed up on a cold Friday night, the house was packed, the music was great, and we were hooked.

Since that first concert we've presented Bill Staines, Vance Gilbert, Garnet Rogers, Birds of Chicago, Brother Sun, Tim Grimm, Kim and Reggie Harris, Karen Savoca and Pete Heitzman, and a collection of other great performers. We've pledged to support Wisconsin musicians as well as regional and national performers - Patchouli, Mark Croft, Cris Plata, Beth Kille, The Stellanovas (Mary Gaines and Chris Waggoner), The Listening Party from Milwaukee, Bill Camplin, and Randy Sabien have all brought their musical talent to our home. We have brought in familiar performers as well as taken chances on new talent, and we've enjoyed every single concert. So have our audiences.

We are having such a good time that we can't stop setting up new concerts. This spring we are bringing back Brother Sun (on their final tour, sad to say) on March 5, followed by Madison's Ritt Dietz Trio on Friday, April 21. Bill and Randy are returning on June 2, and Joe Crookston and Claudia Schmidt will be back later this fall. We're working on some exciting additional options in the near future.

People frequently ask us questions about why we do house concerts.

Aren't they so much work? How do you find the performers? Aren't you worried about strangers walking off with your silverware? Do you really let people use your bathroom? Have you been busted by the police following a neighbor's complaint?

The answers are really quite simple: Yes, the concerts take some work. We have to make a deal with an agent or artist and negotiate a date and payment terms. We have to promote the concerts; we do that by putting the word out to our email friends and neighborhood listserves, send notices to the Simply Folk, WORT and Mad-Folk calendars, and even hand out flyers in our Tenney neighborhood. We spiff up the house, move the furniture around, schlep about 50 chairs up from the basement, put the beer and soda on ice, and wait nervously for the crowd to show up.

Then there's always the question, "what if we don't sell enough tickets to pay our musicians?" No problem there, as it turned out. We have sold out every show but one in the past five years. All our proceeds go to our performers. We are true believers that the work they do is really important and they should be paid top dollar.

Finding performers is really quite easy. Once you do a couple concerts, you will have artists or their agents knocking at your door or filling your InBox. We get requests from friends and local music lovers all the time. We attend lots of festivals and local concerts, check artists' websites and You Tube videos, and keep an eye on the Madison music scene. We listen carefully to every musician we hear about

to see if they will work in our house. For every show we present, we have to turn down three or four offers to play at our house, but we always send on those requests to other folks doing concerts in the area. We've learned that the 21st century Woody Guthries traveling the back roads and highways of America are looking for friendly places to make music and a few bucks to keep going.

It may be hard to believe, but in a nearly 40-concert run we've never had a problem with a drunken guest, and our mismatched silverware is just not worth taking. We've met lots of friendly, neighborly people from Madison and beyond. Sometimes the performers stay with us and we have the pleasure of getting to know them as friends. The rush of getting a big Thank You! from a Joe Crookston or Garnett Rogers, followed by a big round of applause from our guests, makes the work worthwhile.

So far, so good on the noise complaints from neighbors and no visits from the police department. Our shows end by 10 pm and acoustic music never shakes our neighbors' windows.

The bottom line for us is that we love music, we enjoy throwing a good party, and we've had a blast greeting old friends and making new ones. We are big believers in building community. What better way to do that than hosting a house concert?

We Banjo 3 is an award-winning band of brothers from Galway, Ireland. They combine Irish traditional music with old-time Americana and bluegrass influences to reveal the banjo's rich legacy and roots. Enda & Fergal Scahill and Martin & David Howley are among the most celebrated and distinguished musicians in Ireland today. They are holders of multiple All Ireland music titles on banjo, fiddle, bodhran and guitar. Their latest album, String Theory, recently debuted at #1 on the Billboard World Music Charts.

Gaelic Storm has straddled the line between tradition and innovation for nearly two decades. Led by founding members Patrick Murphy and Steve Twigger, the group infuses traditional Celtic music with modern influences, updating the genre for a new generation of fans raised on rock, country and folk. Along the way, the musicians have topped the Billboard World Chart four times, appeared in the blockbuster film "Titanic" (where they performed "Irish Party in Third Class," an unreleased song made available for the first time on Full Irish) and earned a reputation as a hard-touring, genre-bending band. Regularly playing more than 120 shows a year, Gaelic Storm has built a loyal following as diverse as the band's own music. Fans of traditional Irish music have championed the group for years, but so have fans of harder-edged Celtic rock.



Shine a Light: Field Recordings from the Great American Railroad - bill bragg & joe henry cooking vinyl ~ 2016

Last March a pair of singer-songwriters took an ambitious trip together. British activist Billy Bragg and American producer Joe Henry boarded the Texas Eagle at Chicago's Union Station, two days they later pulled into Los Angeles's Union Station. Along the way they recorded this collection of railroad songs, on platforms and trackside, in depots and sleeping berths, and one noteworthy hotel room. If that all sounds a little gimmicky, you're right it is, and in the hands of lesser musicians that's all it would have been. But Bragg and Henry make it something more- a travelogue, a history lesson and a carefully curated compilation of folk songs- all recorded on location with just two guitars and two vocals. There are constant reminders of the intimacy and immediacy of the recordings, a flock of grackles in Texas, a loudspeaker announcing tracks in St Louis, the bustle of passengers in Chicago, and, surprisingly just once, a burst of applause in Tucson. The introspective pairing of each tune with location takes you on vacation with them.

They take full advantage of the acoustics in the grandly massive Great Hall in downtown Chicago, recording the album's first three tracks there to start their journey. These are some of the record's most familiar tunes. "Rock Island Line" is done call and response style, Bragg's gravely growl answering Henry's smooth croon. Unlike some versions, they keep the speed under control, every

word is intelligible. In fact, nowhere in the course of thirteen tracks do they seem hurried, content to just roll along. Their haunted take on "The L&N Don't Stop Here Anymore" is a highlight. Bragg's vocals are dark and languid, and the hall sounds as abandoned as the train station in the song. Their take on "The Midnight Special" is about as up-tempo as the pair gets, maybe because the journey is about to begin.

First stop St Louis. They didn't have time to visit the station here, so they recorded "Railroad Bill" next to the track. The tale of the notorious train robber gets character from the brake squeals and announcer's voice in the background. San Antonio proved a productive stop. In contrast to "Bill," their ghostly "In the Pines" and the melancholy "Gentle on my Mind" are free of any superfluous noise. The latter marks Henry's best vocal turn, and it's a gorgeous one. The old mission style station's depot #2 where the songs were recorded no longer sees any passenger traffic; instead it serves as an upscale function space. In order to gain admittance to the hall, the pair had to spend the night in town. They chose their lodging thoughtfully. Room 414 at the Gunter Hotel was were Robert Johnson, the King of the Delta Blues, made his first recordings. Their choice of song was just as poignant, "Waiting for a Train" was written by Jimmie Rodgers, one of country music's first stars. and a former train worker. Their trek ended on March 18 at 4:30 am in Los Angeles, making Gordon Lightfoot's "Early Morning Rain" an appropriate selection. It isn't a train song in the traditional sense, but the narrator does bemoan the fact that "you can't jump a jet plane like you can a freight train."

Following two volumes of Mermaid Avenue's Woody Guthrie songs, the Essex-born Bragg has emerged as a prolific recorder of American folk music. It may not make sense, but with collaborators like Joe Henry and Wilco, it certainly works.


