MadFolk celebrating Willy Street Fair's 40th Year September 16th and 17th

Willy Street Fair is celebrating 40 years, and we are excited to be celebrating a decade of bringing some great music to the Folk Stage.

We will be kicking off the fair on Saturday with 3 great sets of music,

2:00 – Kaia Fowler makes her debut of our stage, with soaring vocals and accomplished guitar playing, Kaia shares songs that explore life's struggles and joys, drawing on folk, blues, and roots rock traditions. Inspired by nature and the human experience, Kaia's songs resonate with strength and vul-



nerability as she explores a vast emotional landscape. In concert, Kaia draws from an extensive repertoire of originals and select cover songs by artists such as John Prine and Carole King. Her songwriting has been compared to Joni Mitchell's for its lyrical poetry and rich melodies. The Americana Gazette had this to say about her 2010 album Seams of My Heart: "Fowler is a tremendous lyricist. Her lyrics paint pictures and her musical notes add the color ... " Kaia's latest album is an EP titled All The Way, dedicated to her late husband and benefiting the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network. 3:30 Beth Kille will also be making her debut on the Folk Stage, Beth is a 22-time Madison



Area Music Association (MAMA) award winning artist from Madison, WI who has been cranking out her unique blend of rock, country, folk and blues since 2000. From the intimacy of house concerts and coffee houses, to rockin' out with her band headlining spots at festivals, her love for the stage and genuine passion for performance shine through in all settings. Her stage prowess was recognized in 2011 when she received Artist of the Year honors at the Madison Area Music Awards - a rare accomplishment for a solo artist. She has also been honored twice with the MAMA for Female Vocalist of the Year ('06, '10) and was nominated for Singer-Songwriter of the Year in 2014 and Female Vocalist of the Year in 2017 by the Wisconsin Area Music Industry (WAMI).

5:00 Cris Plata no stranger to Madison, as he makes his second appearance here at the Folk Stage. Cris was born in South Texas, the son of migrant workers. Those early days of living in different migrant camps and following the harvest from region to region, exposed Cris to a wide range of musical experiences. His early musical experiences reflect his Mexican heritage.

Hello I Must Be Going

For my last **Whither Zither** I thought it only appropriate to feature an old photo of an old zither that appeared in the **Public Domain Review** I talked about in the last issue. Google translates the caption --"Kone med Langleig fra Valders" -- as "Wife with Langleig from Valders." Valdres (the more common spelling) is a region in south central Norway about halfway between Oslo and Bergen.

The Langeleik or langleik is a droned zither, with one melody string and up to 8 drone strings (!) according to **Wikipedia**, which has more info on the instrument. These zithers have been around for awhile; in 1980 a langeleik dated as early as 1524 was uncovered on a Norwegian farm. Also pictured is a dansdukke or "dancing doll," which looks like it's attached somehow to the zither. I imagine it is related to the Appalachian dancing man or *limberjack*, also called a *jig doll*, among many other names.

Marcus Selmer took this photograph. He was an interesting fellow, born and trained as a pharmacist in Denmark, where he experimented with daguerreotype photography. In 1852, he travelled to Norway to visit his uncle's family in Bergen and never returned, setting up shop there as a photographer. His work became very popular and he was appointed the royal photographer in 1880. Selmer's photographs are by now in the public domain and reside in the **National Library of Norway.**

And I guess that's it for Whither Zither. This has been a spellbinding twenty year run for me, and as I said in the June episode, I owe a great debt of thanks to **Madison Folk Music Society** and its former president Mike Tuten and current president Darlene Buhler for allowing me to ramble on. And to all my dear faithful



readers and contributors, I will never be able to thank you enough. A special thanks is reserved for my wife Kristi Seifert, who not only encouraged and put up with me all along but came up with the name *Whither Zither* in the first place.

I'll leave a few years of columns online at **louandpeter.com**, and many are archived on the society's website (**madfolk.org**) within the back issues **Mad Folk News**. Some diehards have encouraged me to put out a book of selected columns so there is some movement in that direction; who knows? Meanwhile, my love to y'all, and thank you again. See you in the folding chairs.

2:00 – We are going to tweak our regular 2 sets of music in to one long set, and bring you three musicians in the round! Peter, Paul & Josh... kind of has a ring to it.

Josh Harty's unique blend of American music has become a must-hear for those who keep the tradition of country, blues and folk



close to their hearts. Born and raised on the plains of North Dakota, Harty grew up playing shows across the Midwest with his father,

a small-town police chief and preacher. The touring bug has never left Josh as he now continuously travels across Europe and North America. Harty is always looking for that balance between the rolling road and the people who inspire him, trading stories

around kitchen tables and theatre stages. His live shows prove that good storytelling combined with journeyman musicianship is as American as music gets.

Paul Cebar is giving the band the day off as he joins us for an acoustic set of music. Paul brings forth a funky, lyrically charged racket that is explosive, yet intimate.

> Taking cues from the dance bands of western Louisiana (and his native Midwest,), the streets (and 45's) of New Orleans, touring African Caribbean and combos and the soul, funk & blues of his youth, Paul Cebar is a masterful synthesist of rhythmic culture. His time spent in his second home of New Orleans, as a musicologist

in Florida, and as a journeyman wanderer in Cuba, is reflected in his musical worldview. At the core is gifted songwriting, and the company Paul keeps bears it out: Bonnie Raitt, Nick Lowe, Chris Smither, John Hiatt and Cesar Rosas are among his friends and admirers.

Peter Mulvey – Sometimes to say less, is to say more. It does not get better than Peter. He has played this stage before, he has played many stages in Madison, and we never get enough of him. If you have seen him, I know you'll be here, and if you're new to his music, he won't disappoint.

5:00 - We close the festival out with a par-



ty – Listening Party that is! Americana/Folk rock trio out of Milwaukee, WI that has put their own twist on acoustic music. Stories of love and personal struggle are presented playfully and performed sincerely by singersongwriter, Weston Mueller. He is complemented by crafty musicianship from mates Joshua Hester (Mandolin, Guitar, Bass) and Jacob Wood (piano, vocals); former California surf rock bassist and music education teacher, respectively.

Recently, they have been featured on NPR and also are repeat performers at Summerfest (headlined by Third Eye Blind, Michael Franti, Collective Soul and Pentatonix) and have also been opening acts for Diamond Rio, Banditos and Dead Horses



The Fire Sermon - john statz self-released - 2017

You don't know what you've got till it's gone, or so the saying goes. It does seem especially true of the folk singers that have passed through our town. It was easy to take for granted songwriters like Blake Thomas and Dietrich Gosser, who used to play frequently around town but have since moved on. While those artists haven't released any new music since leaving Madison, that's not true for everyone. John Statz left Madison for the mountains of Denver in 2010 and kept a high musical profile. Apparently, he hasn't been home much since, his recording and touring schedule are impressive. His newest release, and seventh overall, The Fire Sermon is a testament to his growth as a singer and a songwriter. An engaging and immensely enjoyable listen, the record only needs a few spins before the songs are old friends.

Perhaps the friendliest of these is "Red Rose Motel," a co-write with Peter Mulvey, one of the best Wisconsin songwriters who still lives in the state. It's easy to picture the two of them brainstorming this infectious tune in the cozy confines of the Café Carpe during one of Mulvey's Lamplighter sessions. A pounding piano propels the insanely catchy chorus, "Tell it to me, tell it to me, tell it to me true, baby when I'm thinking all I think about is you." It's two and a half minute running time leaves you wanting more, but I think that's the idea. Equally memorable is the reflective "Independence Pass." Named for a popular pass along the continental divide in Colorado, it follows the tale of a couple grown apart. Even though they couldn't make it last, at first "we stayed in touch as the years went past," though by the next verse that's changed to "we

lost touch as the years went past." Still, we're as surprised as the narrator when he finds out his ex has died, even more surprised when it's a climbing accident. The whole story is told so seamlessly that we feel like we were there for the entire arc of the relationship, even though it covers forty years in three minutes.

While the record's title comes from T.S. Eliot's epic "The Wasteland," the record's subject is really the fire of love. There are all kinds of love here, new, old, romantic, passionate and faded. Opening track "Cashmere" is the spark of new love, "on that drive I informed you how I felt, I burned for you, and the smile you flashed is burning, burning." "Phone Rings," with its haunting guitar, may be the most bewitching song ever about a booty call. Of course the situation is more complicated than that, and it ends by repeating "And I love you" to the fade out. "Tell Yourself the Truth" gets bluesy with a Wurlitzer organ as Statz testifies that the truth is "there's no more me and you, there's just me and you just happen to be here too." Ouch. The record's subtle gem is "With Some Horses," which seems to exist somewhere in the space between Croce's "Time in a Bottle" and Nilsson's "Everybody's Talking." A gentle acoustic ballad brimming with affection and ache, it's a standout track that gets better with every listen. Turns out there is a lot of love, and a lot to love, in The Fire Sermon.
