

# Holiday Fundraiser with Common Chord and Special Guest Nelson Graham to Benefit Arbor Good Neighbor House, Sat. December 7

Local Americana group Common Chord continues their annual tradition of offering a holiday-themed benefit concert while supporting a local nonprofit. This year's show will benefit and be held at Arbor Good Neighbor House (2509 McDivitt Road, Madison), on Saturday, December 7, starting at 7:00 pm. Light food and snacks will be available for purchase at 6:30 pm.

Admission is simply a donation to Arbor Good Neighbor House at the door or at agnh.org. Arbor Good Neighbor House (AGNH), a 501(c) (3), offers à welcome space where neighbors gather to create a supportive community. Since 2013, Arbor Good Neighbor House (formerly Arbor Covenant Church) has partnered with two local nonprofits to house and staff the Good Neighbors Personal Essentials Pantry, which provides basic cleaning products and personal care items at no cost to local families facing



challenging times; over 550 households are served annually. In addition, AGNH is home to Creek Day School, providing early childhood education to a diverse population of 25+ children per year. AGNH also assists local refugee groups to resettle and integrate members of the Madison refugee community. A 16-plot community garden and recreational space for neighbors to use and enjoy is located on the AGNH grounds. AGNH is 100% volunteer run.

"The need to help our neighbors with basic essentials grows exponentially each year," explained Peter Morris, AGNH executive director.

Host group Common Chord, a five-piece folk/Americana group based in Madison, performs originals from three writers in the group plus their spin on tunes from The Grateful Dead, Traveling Wilburys, Paul Simon, Gershwin, The Beatles, and more. Their harmony-packed arrangements are

backed by a variety of acoustic instruments, creating a magical soundscape. They have published several recordings and will have their new fulllength Christmas CD available at the show (all proceeds will go to AGNH). For more about Common Chord visit commonchord.us

#### TexiCali - dave alvin & jimmie dale gilmore featuring the guilty ones 2024 - yep roc records

Jimmie Dale Gilmore is from Texas and Dave Alvin is from California. Gilmore's a little bit country, and Alvin's a little bit rock and roll. In case you didn't get that on 2018's Downey to Lubbock (as in CA and TX), the duo is back to remind you on TexiCali, which is just as irresistible as its predecessor. The pairing of these singular voices may have seemed unlikely then, but anyone who has seen the live show can attest to the fact that they are meant for each other. The 79-yearold Gilmore is like a kid on a sugar high, while the normally curmudgeonly Alvin, ten years his junior, grins ear to ear from beginning to end. Heck, Alvin is even growing out his hair seemingly in imitation of Gilmore's long gray locks. That camaraderie is also reflected in Jon Langford's iconic cover art, the duo smiles widely here, in contrast with his stoic portraits on the first record. Their first collaboration was recorded in LA with studio ringers, but this time they recorded with the Guilty Ones who have been Alvin's backing band for a decade plus. Drummer Lisa Pankratz, bassist Brad Fordham, keyboardist Bukka Allen and guitarist Chris Miller, backed the duo on their first tour and it became obvious they should be in the studio.

Opening track "Borderland" made its first appearance on Gilmore's 1996 release Braver Newer World. That original music box version is punched up here with Alvin's distinctive guitar and backing vocals. Gilmore's Borderland may be more a feeling than a real place, "So good to be home in the Borderland where things are not what they seem. So good to be home in the Borderland between the dawn and the dream," but in his quavering tenor there is no doubt it's magic. The previously unreleased "Trying to be Free" is even older- Gilmore wrote it over 50 years go, and only recently rediscovered it. With Alvin's help, it fits in perfectly here, although its lyrics ("And one day when you're crying you will know that it's for trying to be free") likely mean something different a half century later. Unlike most of Gilmore's catalog, Downey did not include a song by his Flatlander bandmate Butch Hancock. That oversight is remedied this time around with "Roll Around," a slinky, reggae-esque tune with haunting vocals. It's easy to understand how Alvin heard Stonewall Jackson's "Why I'm Walking" and imagined Gilmore singing it. But his imagination didn't stop there, and the result is an R&B/rockabilly shaker that Chuck Berry would have totally dug.

Alvin only sings lead on two songs, but he makes them count. "Blind Owl," a tribute to Canned Heat's Alan Wilson, smolders as only he can (think "Harlan County Line"). When he says "I'm gonna make this guitar growl" he's actually growling. As he sings "I'll be back on the road again" Gilmore plays a Heat worthy propulsive harmonica behind him. I'm always a sucker for a train song, and the dreamy panorama of "Southwest Chief," which Alvin wrote with the late Bill Morrisey, makes me want to buy a ticket from Chicago to LA right now. Kansas City, Santa Fe, the Mojave, coyotes, condors, and "nameless small towns," are all part of the journey. When he sings "Southwest Chief, let your whistle blow. Wherever you're heading, I want to go," I just nod in agreement. Of course, some of the real magic happens when they trade vocals. "Death of the Last Stripper," written by Alvin and Jo and Terey Allen, is poignant and subdued, while Brownie McGhee's "Betty and Dupree" may be even more tragic. The pair alternate lines as they unroll the tale of Dupree who landed in jail robbing a jewelry store to get Betty a ring, only to have her leave him for another man when he's incarcerated. The record closes with the rollicking pianodriven Alvin/Gilmore co-write "We're Still Here." Alvin reflects on outlasting music business men and venues, while Gilmore is more esoteric, singing about what it means to be alive. Not only are they still here, they are making some of the best music of their careers.
