Liz and Tina played together for many years in the Oak Street Ramblers; Colin and Jeff played together in the Barley Brothers, Cajun Strangers, and the Dirty Shirts, who Liz joined in 2019 to perform two classic Gram Parsons records at several live shows. Now, the four long-time friends perform together for the first time in celebration of the musical legacy of one of the best songwriters of our time, John Prine.


The band started last year as a collaboration between Jeff and Chuck Bayuk, who worked with Liz on a set of John Prine earlier this year. Sadly, Chuck passed away in October, and we never got to play these songs with him. The January show will honor Chuck by including the songs he selected but wasn't able to perform. "Chuck opened my eyes to a whole bunch of John's songs that I'd never considered playing, like Blue Umbrella

and Long Monday," said Jeff. "Chuck was an amazing singer and interpreter of John's songs, so our goal is to play them with the heart and soul that Chuck brought to them."

Anyone who has read any of Sandra Boynton's books to a child knows how magical her writing and illustrations are (especially my favorite, the ridiculously entertaining Pajama Time!). After 85 books and six records of what she calls "renegade children's music" made with collaborator Michael Ford, she finally takes on the most magical time of the year. Cows and Holly proudly proclaims itself as all ages and for everyone everywhere, and it certainly does its best to live up to that promise. The result is fourteen tracks (words and music by Boynton, arranged by Ford) that run the gamut from spoken word to showtunes to surf to sleepy. The musical guest stars skew older, and are more likely to appeal to the parents, grandparents, and maybe even great grandparents, than to the children her work usually targets. There are several real gems in the collection, along with some filler. You know, just like any Christmas record not recorded by Bing Crosby.

The title track is the one most likely to engage the kids. The one case where Boynton did not write the music, it's sung to the tune of the traditional Welsh carol "Deck the Halls" with the parenthetical of (Cows and Holly). It's an evolution of her 2022 book Moo, Baa, Fa La La La! Which itself evolved from Moo, Baa, La La La, one of the bestselling Boynton books of all time. The song is performed by the mysterious O.K. Chorale, which features Mark-Linn Baker (yep, Cousin Larry!). The song most likely to engage everyone is opening track "Sky Surfing," a brilliantly bizarre mash

up of a spaghetti western soundtrack and Patrick Warburton as Santa. The sardonically smug Warburton with his instantly recognizable voice is brilliant in this role. "They say it's eight tiny reindeer with one big sleigh, seems highly unlikely, but I know it's that way," he intones in that distinct baritone before explaining "That's right, I'm Santa Claus. Ho, ho, ho. Sky surfing. Let's ride." Even better is when he goes off script as he names the reindeer, getting stuck after Cupid, "On... Igor, maybe?" It's the kind of performance that would make William Shatner proud.

The CD is definitely front-loaded. Warburton's epic is followed by Broadway superstar Patti LuPone's catchy "Holiday Jazz Parade." Backed by a New Orleans style jazz band, the song builds and then fades as the parade moves on. Bring out your jazz hands. "Going Home Now" is a perfect fit for Lyle Lovett's laid-back delivery, always welcome even if it isn't especially Christmas-y. Zooey Deschanel is no stranger to Christmas, having starred in perennial favorite Elf and recording two holiday records with M Ward as She & Him. Her "Dance with Santa Claus" bursts with 50's style charm. Best line- "We could deck the halls with... Buddy Holly!" From there it's a bit of a slog to get to Chris Collingwood (of Fountains of Wayne) and his delightful, and very inclusive, New Year's Eve party "Just a Few of My Friends." In between we have "Videmus Nivem" done in chant and churchy choir by Falls Mountain Camerata. It seems wildly out of place, even on a record for everyone, everywhere. Yo-Yo Ma is wasted backing Linda Eder on the dull "In December." Boynton's daughter Darcy does a fine, if unremarkable, job on "Bring It On" and "So Cold for So Long." Meanwhile, son Keith puts on an Irish accent for "Firelight Jig." Raul Esparza channels Frank Sinatra in the best way on "It's Got to Be Christmas." Even better is collaborator Michael Ford's finger snapping acapella turn with the '53 Fords on "Snow, Snow, Snow." He closes the record with "Forever Christmas," a pleasant instrumental to send you on your way.

The CD comes in a "festive picture book" in two sections. The first half is "look while you listen," which makes even the dull songs more interesting when accompanied by adorable cats, dogs, pigs and cows. The second is "sing and play along" with complete lyrics and music. With a list price of \$19.99, it really is a bargain, perfect for the kids of any age on your list.
