David Francey Returns to the Mad-Folk stage on February 9th!

Pure excitement is all I can say for this show!

David Francey is a Scottishborn Canadian carpenter-turnedsongwriter, who has become known as "one of Canada's most revered folk poets and singers" (Toronto Star). Born in Ayrshire, Scotland to parents who were factory workers, he moved to Canada when he was twelve. For decades, he worked across Canada in rail yards, construction sites, and in the Yukon bush, all the while writing poetry, setting it to melodies in his head and singing it to himself as he worked.

A truly authentic folk singer, Francey is a documentarian of the working person who never imagined earning a living from his music. But when he was in his 40s, his wife, artist Beth Girdler, encouraged him to share his songs and sing in public. The reaction was instant. His first album Torn Screen Door came out in 1999 and was a hit in Canada.

Since then, David has released thirteen albums, won four Juno Awards, Francey also had the honor of receiving the prestigious SOCAN Folk Music Award as well as taking home the Grand Prize in both the International Acoustic Music Award and in the Folk category for the John Lennon Songwriting Award.

"David's straightforward songs tell honest stories of real people and real places. Poetic perception and a keen eye for the heart of the matter are trademarks of the man and his music. David Francey was born in Ayrshire, Scotland where he got his first taste of the working life as a paperboy. At age 10 he was devouring the newspapers he delivered, establishing a life-long interest in politics and world events while developing the social conscience that forms the backdrop of his songs, you will hear a little of this in his song Paper Boy.

He was twelve when his family immigrated to Toronto. He says he can trace his love of the land, the history, and the people of his adopted country to weekend family drives exploring southern Ontario. Music played a large part in these family outings. They sang traditional Scottish tunes as they drove through the Canadian countryside. Dad and sister Muriel sang melody, while mother and David sang harmonies.


His attachment to Canada grew with travel. He hitched across the

country three times, then thumbed his way to the Yukon. This attachment surfaces in his songs of rail farms, lines, the and St. Lawrence Seaway. He grew to understand the people while working in Toronto train vards, the bush, Yukon and as a carpenter in the Eastern Townships. These experiences colour his first CD, Torn Screen Door. with songs like Hard Steel Mill, Gypsy Boys, and Working Poor and his

second, Far End of Summer, with Highway, Flowers of Saskatchewan and February Morning Drive.

In concert David is a singer and a storyteller. His wry humor and astute observations combined with his openhearted singing style have earned him a loyal following.

Switzky and Kieler to Play The Bur Oak Jan. 22

Wisconsin singer-songwriters Bryant Switzky and Melissa Kieler are sharing the stage at The Bur Oak January 22 (doors at 6, show at 7) for an evening of songs, stories, and banter. They're both fantastic songwriters and will trade off performing their own songs and collaborate on a few numbers too.

Switzky played MadFolk's stage at the Willy Street Fair in 2023 and Kieler played it in 2024. "I've gotten to know Melissa a bit over the past couple years," Switzky said. "I helped emcee the MadFolk stage in September, and Melissa's show blew me away. Afterward, I suggested we book a gig together."

Switzky is based in Verona and performs soulful acoustic music that blends folk, blues, Americana, and pop. He worked as a newspaper reporter for many years and is known for writing clever lyrics about life, love, parenthood, and loss. His melodies come with big hooks and he sings them like he means it. He's got a percussive guitar style and uses live-triggered harmonies to give his solo shows a big sound.

Kieler is based in Monroe and blends folk, rock, and pop. She plays piano, guitar, and bass, but the real story is her standout voice. She's a powerhouse singer who has been compared to Melissa Etheridge, Adele, and Amy Winehouse. Her voice grabs you, moving between genres with grace and style. She's played in a variety of bands in the area, has been a long time instructor at the Girls Rock Camp of Madison, and owns a wellness and massage business in Monroe called Healing Notes.

Bur Oak show for a couple years," said Switzky, who rejoined the Madison-area music scene in 2023 after 20 years away in the Twin Cities and Washington, D.C. "I play about 20 shows a year, but most of them are free for the audience. It takes time to build a base of fans who will buy tickets for a sit-down, listening room show. And that's what this January 22 show will be."

Switzky's songs have been recognized more than a dozen times in national and international songwriting contests, and his latest album (his third) and songs from it were finalists for four Madison Area Music Awards in 2023.

The Folk Ball Festival invites you to kick cabin fever to the curb at Memorial Union on January 24-25, 2025. This is the 35th time around for Madison's largest and liveliest participatory folkdance festival, featuring huge evening-long dance parties Friday and Saturday (eight bands in all!), workshops and a Hungarian tanchaz during the day Saturday, and a fine dinner (optional) Saturday evening. Workshops include sessions on Balkan, Carpathian, and Rueda (Cuban salsa) dance styles, as well as Bulgarian Singing and Folk Ball 101, a quickstart introduction to live music line dancing. The Balkan Dance workshops will be presented by Featured Teacher Michael Ginsburg who so inspired us at the 2020 festival.

Folk Ball highlights Eastern European line dances (once a year is not too often!) but Wisconsin Polka and Cuban Rueda are also on offer this time around. Get in, give it a try!

Cunningham Bird - andrew bird and madison cunningham 2024 - loma vista

This could be subtitled "the strange case of Buckingham Nicks." Recorded by Stevie Nicks and Lindsey Buckingham in 1973, it wasn't commercially successful and was ignored by their label Polydor. However, Mick Fleetwood heard one of the songs while touring Sound City where it was recorded, and that led directly to the invitation to join Fleetwood Mac. Here's where it gets weird. Despite becoming household names, Buckingham Nicks has never been reissued. Unopened copies go for hundreds of dollars on eBay, and where it has been unofficially ripped to YouTube there are millions of listens and thousands of comments, most a variation on "I will never sell my copy." For music lovers who weren't buying albums in the Seventies, you know, because they were eight years old and hopelessly uncool (or maybe that's just me), there is now a way to own a physical copy of these songs. Though not the original versions. The prodigiously talented and unpredictable Andrew Bird has teamed up with singer/songwriter Madison Cunningham for a track-bytrack cover of Buckingham Nicks. Cunningham, who has been called "a new spin on West Coast folk-rock" by Rolling Stone, and is nearly the same age Nicks was at the time of recording, is a natural for the part. She and Bird have an unmistakable chemistry, her airy vocals weaving in and out of his gently plucked or bowed violin, and his voice pairing

well with hers.

The pair had been looking for a way to collaborate beyond their own music. Bird is effusive on the subject of Cunningham's voice. "Her voice is goosebump inducing, nimble and emotive at any volume," he says, "I just had to find the right project for us to go deep on." Beyond the eponymous players, the only other musicians featured are drummer Griffin Goldsmith and producer Mike Viola, who added percussion, bass and keyboards. They strip down, reimagine, and re-build without over embellishing. The running time comes in a few minutes short of the thirty-six minutes of the original. Opening track "Crying in the Night" sets the stage. The pair trade vocals while Bird's violin plinks, swells, and even occasionally sounds thereminesque. Instead of alternating leads vocals track by track, they treat every song like a duet. The original version of "Without a Leg to Stand On" sounds like pure Fleetwood Mac with jangly guitar and a sunny melody. Cunningham and Bird tone down the jangle, trading it for a dreamy wistfulness. Never one to adhere to the traditional violin technique, Bird coaxes a sound akin to a flute from his instrument. After its skronky opening, "Don't Let Me Down Again" barely strays from its source material, other than replacing guitars with propulsive violin, resulting in the most upbeat track here.

"Races Are Run" here is lovely, but more serious than the original. "Lola" benefits from Cunningham's thoughtful reading of Buckingham's lascivious tune. The pair of instrumentals, "Stephanie" and "Django," are made more interesting by Cunningham's wordless vocalizing. In reworking "Frozen Love," they echo a different Seventies supergroup. Blind Faith's "Can't Find My Way Home" provides a blueprint for what turns out to be a powerful final track. It's hard to know what exactly drew the duo to the project, but it must be something beyond the pleasing parallel structure of their names. Bird admits, "The best reason to cover anyone is that little part of you that thinks you might do it better." On the other hand, I believe the best reason to cover someone is if you can make it your own, Cunnigham and Bird do that. I wouldn't say it's better, but it is equally good in beautiful and creative ways.


